- Learn about and demonstrate honesty, respect and responsibility.
- Learn about and demonstrate determination, resilience and positive thinking.

Through the provision of a rich selection of school-based and extra-curricular activities, we encourage children to actively participate in all aspects of school life, developing enterprise, sport, creative and artistic skills, as well as exploring new opportunities and discovering possible future interests.

We encourage children to approach challenges and new experiences with positivity, to realise that mistakes are an important part of learning and to be proud of their efforts when they have given their best.

In Sept 2021, the OFSTED inspectors judged our school to be Outstanding with some areas for development and described our main strengths as:

- Pupils are proud of their school and enjoy attending. The positive relationships between staff and pupils make Irby Primary School a happy and calm place to learn. Pupils feel safe and are safe. Adults take the time to listen to pupils and help them if they have any worries or concerns.
- Teaching staff expect pupils to do their best in lessons. Pupils live up to these high expectations. Pupils enjoy the interesting and fun learning. Pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) are given the right type of support so that they can achieve well too.
- The recently appointed headteacher has very quickly evaluated the strengths and weaknesses of the school. Together with the staff and governors, he is determined to give all pupils the best start to their education
- Leaders place much emphasis on ensuring that pupils become confident and fluent readers. The teaching of phonics begins as soon as children start in the Reception class.
- Pupils achieve well in reading. Nevertheless, leaders are not complacent and are keen to do even better. They have recently introduced some new ideas. For example, a new approach to guided reading has recently been introduced to further develop pupils' vocabulary and comprehension skills.
- The early years classroom is a hive of activity. Staff take every opportunity to develop and extend children's language and mathematical skills. New and exciting words are introduced as children play. Children quickly settle into well-established routines.
- Pupils with SEND have their needs identified quickly. Clear and precise targets are set for these pupils so that they can learn more and remember more at the right pace for them. These targets are regularly monitored and reviewed. The special educational needs coordinator works well with teachers to help them adapt the curriculum so that pupils with SEND can learn alongside their peers.
- Pupils talk about the wide range of clubs they have enjoyed, such as those for football, dance and gymnastics. They also speak fondly of trips to museums, castles and local parks. These opportunities broaden pupils' experiences. Pupils learn about different faiths and cultures to help them appreciate our diverse society.
- Leaders pay due regard to pupils' mental health and well-being. Staff feel valued and work well as a team. Leaders and governors are mindful of staff's workload and well-being.
- The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff are well trained in safeguarding. This helps them to quickly spot if pupils are becoming anxious or distressed.

LEARNING AND WORKING TOGETHER

Curriculum

- Our curriculum is planned carefully so that all children are inspired and motivated to learn
- We aim to ensure that the curriculum meets the needs of every child and is delivered in a way that helps the children perform well academically as well as feeling happy, safe and secure in their environment
- Our curriculum is broad to ensure children have the chance to shine in different areas
- We take account of children's differing learning styles and ensure our lessons accommodate their varying needs and involve the children in their own learning

Complaints about the Curriculum

Any concerns about the curriculum are settled quickly and informally at school level. The complaints procedure exists for those parents who wish to pursue a complaint through more formal channels. A copy of the complaints procedure is available from the school or directly from the Local Authority.

Gifted and Talented Children

We identify children who have the ability to function at a higher level in one or more of the following areas:

- Academic – English, Mathematics, Science
- Physical – Sport, Dance
- Aesthetic – Music, Art, Drama
- Mechanical – DT, Computing
- Social Skills – Leadership, Teamwork

We then:

- Adjust tasks and expectations
- Provide enrichment and extension activities to motivate and challenge
- Provide opportunities to develop talents
- Signpost outside clubs, events and competitions.



Special Educational Needs

- We are committed to inclusive education. We work closely with parents and outside agencies to identify children with special needs so that we can minimise barriers to learning and ensure children meet their full potential
- Our school has no stairs and we also have modern disabled facilities and access.

Religious Education

- As a school we welcome children from all faiths, backgrounds and cultures. We celebrate our differences and seek to develop respect for the views of others
- We hold strong moral values and encourage everyone to demonstrate those within our school
- Children come together as a whole school for collective worship on a regular basis. We also have good links with our local churches; whether through visits or visitors taking special lessons or assemblies
- Religious Education is taught throughout both Key Stages covering many aspects of Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism, Sikhism and Islam
- Parents have the right to withdraw their children from all forms of religious education and should write to the headteacher if they wish to exercise this.





Parental Involvement

- Parental involvement is key to success with the curriculum. Children thrive when the partnership between home and school works well
- It is by working together that we can ensure high standards in schoolwork, behaviour and attitudes
- We welcome parents into school to share in their child's education and develop positive links between home and school.

Parents of Irby Primary School (PIPS)

PIPS is a group of dedicated parents who, with the support of the school and the local community, organise fundraising events and initiatives in order to raise much needed funds to enhance our children's learning journeys.

We hope that all parents will be able to support PIPS in some way over the time their child is at the school. This doesn't need to be formally as a committee member but attending events, buying raffle tickets (and providing raffle prizes) all make a difference.

Joining PIPS is a great way to meet new people, raise money for our school and have fun along the way!



PROMOTING GOOD HEALTH

We offer a range of opportunities to encourage our children to stay fit and healthy:

- Two hours of PE a week
- Specialist Sports Coaches who work with our children during the year
- Competitions, school teams and tournaments
- Themed days and weeks
- Before and after school clubs
- Lunchtime clubs and activities
- We hold regular cycling events such as Bike-it Breakfasts, and also teach the children to cycle safely and understand sustainability

ENHANCING THE CURRICULUM

We are committed to ensuring our children have the opportunity to enhance their experiences through:

- Trips and visits
- Visitors to school
- Themed curriculum days and weeks
- A range of before, after-school and lunchtime clubs



Music

We are proud of the opportunities we offer to encourage musical development:

- We offer clubs for choir, recorders and guitar
- All children in Year 3 and 4 are taught to play the recorder as part of their school music lessons and all Year 5 and 6 children are taught to play the ukulele.
- We offer peripatetic tuition in brass, woodwind and keyboard and attend music festivals with partner schools.
- A key evening of the year is our Music Evening where children come together to celebrate musical achievement.

Children perform short pieces in groups or as soloists and the 'Young Musician of the Year', is voted for by the audience. Alongside this, gifted singers are given the opportunity to perform a short solo and compete for 'Young Vocalist of the Year'.

This is an excellent way to celebrate musical talent and achievement. Each class performs an annual class assembly with KS1 also performing a Christmas themed production and KS2 producing an end of term performance.



Links outside school:

Irby Primary School is part of the South Deeside Primary Schools' Federation along with Pensby Primary School, Barnston Primary School, Gayton Primary School, Heswall Primary School and Thingwall Primary School. We work as a collaborative group to support and challenge each other, in order to ensure that our schools deliver the best possible education for our children.

We also have strong links with local Secondary Schools:

- KS2 children visit Pensby High School for taster days and to see school productions
- Our KS2 children learn to swim at Calday Grange Grammar School
- Science teachers from West Kirby Grammar School have delivered units of work for our KS2 children
- Past pupils choose to complete work experience at our school
- Many of our children take part in the local libraries' summer reading promotion
- Year Two children visit Irby Methodist Church and our annual carol service takes place at St. Chad's
- We participate in the annual Deeside Schools Coast to Country Environmental project.

COMMUNITY

We are involved in events and support charities locally, nationally and across the world in order to lead our children to a better, fuller understanding of themselves and the world in which they live so that they can become responsible active participants in society.

We support other events happening in the community such as Harvest Festival and we join together to sing with our local community when Father Christmas comes to Irby village to turn on the Christmas lights.



TAKING RESPONSIBILITY

Our children need to be prepared for the world beyond primary school and we therefore provide plenty of opportunities to develop the necessary skills:

Year 5 pupils:

- help in pre-school
- are reading partners to younger children
- help at lunchtime
- are digital leaders

Year 6 pupils:

- are prefects supporting our younger children
- are buddies to children in F2
- run the school library and annual book fair



We have a thriving School Council that contributes to the School Improvement Plan and meets with the governors. We also have an active Eco committee that works hard to help ensure our school is as environmentally friendly as possible.

Transferring to secondary school is a very important and exciting stage in your child's life and we fully support parents and children through the transition period.

KEEPING OUR CHILDREN SAFE

The safety of our children is paramount at Irby Primary School. In 2016 we were commended by the Education Business Awards for Excellence in Health and Safety.

- The school gates are locked during the school day and we also have a secure main entrance
- Children of all ages are taught about online safety and anti-bullying
- Equipment is regularly checked
- Risk assessments are completed for all visits using the Local Authority Evolve system
- Safeguarding measures are stringent and include regular staff training
- We actively promote positive mental health, support children to develop a growth mindset and self esteem

SAFEGUARDING

The protection of a child who may be at some kind of risk is crucial. Sometimes schools receive information from a variety of sources concerned with the protection of individual children from abuse. While we will deal with such information with sensitivity, care and as much confidentiality as possible, there are legal responsibilities and procedures we are expected to follow. A copy of the Safeguarding Policy is available for inspection at the school and on our website.

WHAT OUR CHILDREN WEAR

We like our children to look smart but also want them to be able to dress independently. It is for this reason that our uniform consists of a polo shirt and sweatshirt as opposed to a shirt and tie. The children are not allowed to wear trainers or earrings.

TIMES OF SESSIONS

The beginning of the school day is 8.50am. Following the whistle, the children line up in the playground and we take your child into the classroom.

- Lunchtime – A school lunch is available, the alternative is for you to provide a packed lunch.
- In Reception (Foundation Stage 2) your child will initially go home for lunch, until staff feel your child is ready then he/she can stay for the whole day. All children will stay for the whole day within two weeks.
- The end of the school day for Reception and KS1 (Years 1 and 2) is 3.25pm and KS2 (Years 3, 4, 5 and 6) 3.30pm. A member of staff will accompany the children into the playground and we ask that you come forward to collect your child from us. We will not allow your child to go with anyone else unless you have informed us.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

Admissions to Reception (Foundation Stage 2)

Parents wishing to send their children to our school should complete the Wirral Authority Primary School Application Form which is available on www.wirral.gov.uk on the School Admissions page. Applications must be submitted by the published deadline to ensure the allocation of a place. Applications received after the published deadline will be dealt with once the offer of places has been sent to parents. It is very important to meet the deadline set by the Local Authority.

Children are admitted full time in September unless parents feel that their child is not ready for this. By law, children must start school at the commencement of the term following that in which they have their fifth birthday.

Admissions to any other Year Group (Years 1 to 6)

Parents wishing to send their children to any other year group should make an appointment to see the Headteacher. You are then required to complete an in year transfer form which is available on www.wirral.gov.uk then go to the School Admission page.

Please do not hesitate to contact the Headteacher for further details or clarification regarding admissions. Whilst the Local Authority is the official admissions body, information is available from the school.
